



Additionally, 917 UAC (24 of which pending transfer) have been reported as living in informal/insecure housing conditions such as living temporarily in apartments with others, living in squats, being homeless and moving frequently between different types of accommodation.

UAC shelters

 Current: 63 UAC shelters with total 1653 places

SIL (Supported Independent Living) apartments

- Current: 93 SIL apartments for UAC older than 16 years old with total 372 places
- Planned: -28 SIL apartments with total -112 places

Safe zones*


- Current: 15 Safe Zones for UAC with total 450 places

Hotels**

- Current: 12 Hotels for UAC with total 930 places (1 acts as a transit hub for UAC relocation)
- *Safe Zones are designated supervised spaces within accommodation sites which provide UAC with 24/7 emergency protection and care. They should be used as short term (maximum 3 months) measures to care for UAC in light of the insufficient number of available shelter places. Safe Zone priority is given to UAC in detention as well as other vulnerable children, in line with their best interests.
- **Hotels are emergency accommodation spaces being used as a measure to care for UAC in light of the insufficient number of available shelter places. Priority is given to UAC in Reception and Identification Centers.




